

As in the past, the MT-2 form must signed by their Flotilla Commander prior to being submitted to the DIRAUX office. Any wrong step in the process will unnecessarily delay completing their qualification and receiving credit for VSC activity. the website. When completed, the No-Op Facility is submitted directly to me and the Op-Facility is sent directly to the DIRAUX office. Remember that PWC's can ONLY be examined as an OP-Facility on the 7008 form. My address will be included at the end of these comments.

VADSO Comments

This months comments will refer to #4 of the 7012 form—PFD's. How do you examine PFD's-now referred to as LIFEJACKETS?

Lifejackets must be Coast Guard Approved in good and serviceable condition, and of appropriate size for the intended user. PFD's should not be stowed in plastic bags, in locked or closed compartments or have other gear stowed on top of them. Wearable PFDs must be readily accessible, meaning the intended wearer must be able to put it on in a reasonable amount of time in an emergency (vessel sinking, on fire, etc.) All vessels (including canoes and kayaks of any length) must be equipped with one Type I, II, III, or V PFD for each person aboard. Federal law does not require PFDs on racing shells, rowing skulls, and racing kayaks; state laws vary. Boats 16 feet and longer must also be equipped with one throwable Type IV. Throwable devices must be immediately available

for use-NOT stored in any compartment. Type IV devices include buoyant cushions, ring buoys, and horseshoe buoys. The typical cushions are typically 15 by 15 by 2 inches and have grab straps. Although not required, except in Nevada on vessel 26'+, you may recommend attaching a retrieving line.

A TYPE I PFD, or OFF-SHORE LIFE JACKET though not the most comfortable provides the most buoyancy-22lbs. for an adult and 11 lbs. for a child. It is effective for all waters, especially open, rough, or remote waters where rescue may be delayed.

A TYPE II PFD, NEAR-SHORE
BUOYANT VEST is intended for calm,
inland water or where there is a good
chance of quick rescue. An adult size
device provides 15 ½ lbs. of buoyancy,
a medium child size provides 11 lbs.
Infant and small child sizes each
provide at least 7 pounds buoyancy.
A TYPE III PFD generally the most
comfortable, is available in many styles,
colors, and sizes. It is good for calm, inland

waters, or where there is a good chance of quick rescue. The Type III has the same minimum buoyancy as a Type II pfd. A water skier is considered on board the vessel and a PFD is required for the purposes of compliance with the PFD carriage requirements. It is advisable and recommended for a skier to wear a PFD designed to withstand the impact of hitting the water at high speed. "Impact Class" marking on the label refers to PFD strength, not personal protection. Most state laws require skiers and PWC operators to wear a PFD with an impact rating. Float coats, fishing vests, and vests designed with features suitable for various sports activities are also examples of this type PFD.

A TYPE V PFD, or SPECIAL USE DEVICE is intended for specific activities and may be carried instead of another PFD only if used according to the approval condition on the label. Type V PFDs also have use restrictions marked on them which must be observed. Instruct the boater if a Type V PFD is to be counted toward minimum carriage requirements, it must be worn. Some Type V devices provide significant hypothermia protection. Varieties

include deck suits, work vests, board sailing vests, and Hybrid PFDs. A TYPE V HYBRID INFLATABLE PFD is normally the least bulky of all PFD types. It contains a small amount of inherent buoyancy, and an inflatable chamber. It's performance is equal to or better than a Type I PFD (as noted on the PFD label). These usually apply to children of specific ages, and certain boats and boating operations. Approvals are based on the child's weight. Federal law requires children under 13 years of age to wear a PFD when underway unless below deck or in an enclosed cabin. Within the boundaries of a state that has a PFD requirement for a child, that state's requirement will be adopted. California law requires 11 year and younger, unless in an enclosed cabin. Nevada and Utah is 12 years of age and younger unless in an enclosed cabin.

 - a. A Quick Reference Navigation Rules card.
 - b. Navigation Rules publication, COMDTINST M16672.2.
 - c. Quick Reference & Navigation Rules publications COMDTINST M16672.2.
 - d. Coxswains are not required to own Navigation Rules Publications.

2-A PWC Operational Facility;

- a. Must carry a CG Auxiliary or Patrol Ensign.
- b. Must have at 30' of towline.
- c. Does not need a VHF-FM radio.
- d. Does not need a throwable PFD (Type IV).




♥Division Statistics*



The goal for D11NR for 2008 is **7,500** VSC's. We are **9%** of our goal for the year and **75%** of 2007 production! The data source is AUXINFO. PLEASE be certain that all stats are reported MONTHLY using the CURRENT Form 7038 to your FSO-IS so you and your unit(s) will receive proper credit.

Preliminary stats from AUXINFO* indicates that 292 or 44% of our VSC's are First Time VSC's. In addition 245 or 37% are High Risk VSC's.

Typical vessel examiners encounter "average" vessels, likely in the 18-26' range, mostly power. Vessels in our Division tend to be a mixed breed of sail and power

centering on 24-48', with the occasional larger, ocean-going mega yachts nearing 65'. These big guys tend to take a good hour or so to check, and only if the skipper or owner has their act together on safety requirements. Vessels this size, capable of international destinations, need to consider: EPIRB's, DSC VHF, offshore rafts, immersion suits, and rocket flares. Many of our Division VE's are also cross-qualified in Marine Safety, Program Visitors, Ferry Auditors, AtoN verifiers and even Coast Guard force multiplying watch-standers. Coast Guard to Emphasize Life Jacket Wear

A key outcome of the Coast Guard's Recreational Boating Safety program is to reduce loss of life on the water. A major component of that program is to convince boaters to wear their life jackets while on the water. Various media campaigns have been utilized in the past without a major shift in the desired outcome.

A Vessel Safety Check (VSC) provides the vessel examiner an opportunity to educate the boater on the value and importance of life jacket wear. During the VSC, the criteria for selecting, sizing, and inspection of life jackets is reviewed and demonstrated to the boater.

Public education courses are another venue to demonstrate the variety of life jackets available. Of paramount interest is the inflatable life jacket which offers the boater a comfortable and reliable life saving option.

Public affairs activities, such as safety exhibits at boat shows, provide another venue to illustrate to the public the variety of life jackets available in the market place. The Coast Guard's Office of Auxiliary and Boating Safety firmly believes that our vessel examiners, public educators and public affairs representatives should be role models for life jacket wear and are encouraging them to wear their life jackets during vessel safety checks, public education classes, and public affair events. As an incentive for demonstrating the "right behavior" on and around the water, inflatable life jackets branded with the "Wear It" logo will be made available (on a loner basis) to each Flotilla.

Inflatable life jackets will be distributed to local units which will be responsible for the custody, maintenance, and utilization of this equipment and annual reporting of the local inventory through respective chain of command to the Office of Auxiliary and Boating Safety, Program Operations Branch (*CG*- 54222).

The expectation is that they will be leveraged to provide the maximum possible exposure to support the wearing of life jackets.

If you are simply educating the public on the Quagga and Zebra issues while acting as an Auxiliarist and doing a vessel safety check, no problem. Any type of "inspection" that would support a law enforcement type of activity is out of the question. If an Auxiliarist is in uniform (or Polo Shirt) and wants to be trained to perform some kind of "official inspection" on a citizen's boat, that would not be authorized. So if any lakes require a vessel to pass an inspection before launching, examiners should not participate.
